Eulogies or comments by family or friends as a part of the service are generally discouraged. Although many people may feel initially that they would like to offer comments during the service, they often find out that this is much more difficult to do than they expected. Also, our intent is to stay within a reasonable length of time for the service itself. The homily given during the service by clergy can address many of these personal things learned through conversations with family and friends.

You can involve your family members and friends in your service by designating them to perform certain roles, such as readers, oblationers, chalicifers, greeters, etc. You may indicate any selections for these roles below:

Scripture is always read. The minimum is a reading from one of the Gospels. You may include one reading from either or both of the Old Testament or New Testament, and a psalm. Listed below are selected readings which are appropriate for funeral services:

Additional Comments:

While funeral homes often perform a valuable and necessary service, it is important to remember that they are in business to make a profit and generally do. Many of the services performed by funeral homes at great expense are offered through St. Patrick's at no expense. Before making any plans for your service, your family should first check with the church to schedule a suitable time. The date and time of the service is scheduled by the church—not the funeral home. While we will make every effort to accommodate your family's request, we must also work around the regular church calendar and other scheduled dates.

Obituaries are also a revenue source for newspapers. We can include any appropriate information you desire in an obituary which can be printed in the funeral bulletin at no charge.

The clergy at St. Patrick's do not charge nor expect to receive compensation for conducting services or visiting at home around the time of death; however, it is common and very appropriate for people to offer an honorarium to St. Patrick's, the amount of which is determined by each family.

If a casket is present for the service in the church, it will be closed and covered with a pall (a white cloth which totally covers the casket), The purpose of the pall is to remove physical distinctions of one's social standing. We

are all loved by God. If a floral display or American flag (if appropriate) will cover the casket, those items will be included at the cemetery.

The committal of cremains should be performed immediately following the service in the Memorial Garden or columbarium. It is most appropriate to keep cremains in one place without dividing them up among various locations or among family members.

As a sign of love and support and once again carrying forward the theme of a shared meal, St. Patrick's typically provides a meal for family and friends either before or after the funeral service. There is no cost for this meal. We will ask your family to estimate the number of people who might attend in order that we can plan for a sufficient amount of food.

Video presentations or slide shows are not appropriate during the funeral service and are not allowed. They may be shown in the parish hall following the service if desired during the luncheon time.

Flowers can be used at the altar only and most typically might be an arrangement from the family. Other flowers will be displayed in the parish hall.

It is common to designate memorial contributions but not required. These can be directed to a general or specific fund at St. Patrick's or to a charity or organization of your choice. This information will be included in the funeral bulletin.
